Giant Swallowtail Wild lime, yellowwood, Hercules club, citrus, Biscayne prickly ash and torchwood, nectar from lantana, Bougainvillea,

goldenrod and milkweed

Schaus' Swallowtail Wild lime and torchwood, nectar from a variety of

flowers including wild coffee and guava

Bahamian Swallowtail Citrus, wild lime, and torchwood, unknown Palamedes Swallowtail Plants of the laurel family and red bay, nectar from a variety of flowers including thistle

Great Southern White Saltwort and peppergrass, nectar from a variety of

flowers including saltwort, lantana and other verbena family members

Florida White Milkbark, Guiana plum and limber caper, nectar from a variety

of flowers including lantana

Checkered White Plants in the mustard family, nectar from the composite

and mustard families

Cabbage White Many plants in the mustard family, nectar from many plants including the mustard and caper families

Orange Sulphur Plants in the pea family including alfalfa, white clover

and white sweet clover, nectar from many flowers including
milkweed

goldenrod and aster

Southern Dogface Small-leaved plants in the pea family including alfalfa

and leadplant; clovers and indigo, nectar from flowers including
alfalfa,

coreopsis, houstonia and verbena

Dainty Sulphur Spanish needles, nectar from flowers from flowering plants

Including aster, wild marigold and others

Little Yellow Partridge pea and wild sensitive plant, nectar from flowers in

the aster family including goldenrod

Mimosa Yellow Sensitive plant, in the pea family; wild tamarind, nectar

from various flowers

Dina Yellow Mexican alvaradoa and bitterbush, nectar from various flowers

including lantana

Sleepy Orange Senna species, nectar from flowers including Spanish needles

Barred Yellow Many plants in the pea family, nectar from a great variety of

flowers including Spanish needles and joint vetches

Cloudless Sulphur Bahama senna and privet senna, nectar from many flowers including cordia, bougainvillea, hibiscus, lantana and morning glory

Orange-barred Sulphur Bahama senna, and privet senna, nectar from many

flowers

Large Orange Sulphur Blackbead, cat's claw, and wild tamarind, nectar

from flowers including lantana, Spanish needles, bougainvillea, and hibiscus

Statira Sulphur In Florida, Dalbergia and Calliandra both in the pea family,

nectar from red-flowering plants including firebush

Lyside Sulphur Lignumvitae, nectar from black mangrove and Spanish needles

Yellow Angled-Sulphur Senna species, nectar from red and purple flowers

including hibiscus and bougainvillea

Boisduval's Yellow Senna species, nectar from a variety of flowers

HAIRSTREAKS

Great Purple Hairstreak Mistletoe, nectar from flowers including goldenrod,

Hercules club and Spanish needles

Atala $\,$ Coontie as well as other members of the cycad family, nectar from

flowers including lantana, periwinkle, Spanish needles and wild coffee

White M Hairstreak Live oak and other oak species, nectar from a variety of

 $flowers\ including\ sumac,\ poinsettia,\ milkweed,\ lantana\ and\ goldenrod$

Silver-banded Hairstreak Young seeds of balloon vine, nectar from flowers

of balloon vine

Amethyst Hairstreak Albizia lebbeck, nectar from a variety of flowers

including ape's earring, Brazilian pepper, Guarmachil and Spanish needles

Banded Hairstreak Many species of oak, nectar from many flowers including

milkweed (preferred)

Southern Hairstreak Many species of oak, nectar from a variety of flowers

Red-banded Hairstreak **Dead leaves from various trees and shrubs,**nectar from a variety of flowers including tickseed sunflower and
nilkweed

Fulvous Hairstreak Brazilian pepper, nectar from flowers of Brazilian pepper,

Spanish needles and sea grape

Gray Hairstreak Flowers and fruit from an almost endless variety of

Plants; most often lead tree, nectar from many flowers including milkweed,

mint and goldenrod

Including bay cedar, lantana, Brazilian pepper and Spanish needles

Bartram's Scrub-Hairstreak Pineland croton, nectar from flowers of pineland

croton and Spanish needles

Mallow Scrub-Hairstreak Plants in the mallow family; also bay cedar,

nectar from many small-flowered plants

BLUES

Eastern Pygmy-Blue Annual glassworts and saltwort in the amaranth family, nectar from flowers of palmetto palm and saltwort

Cassius Blue Plumbago, rattlebox, hairy milk pea and lima beans,

from flowers of Spanish needles and creeping charlie
Ceraunus Blue A variety of legumes including partridge pea and wild

tamarind, flower nectar

Miami Blue Balloon vine and nickerbean, flower nectar including Spanish

needles

Nickerbean Blue Pineland acacia, sweet acacia and caesalpinia, flower

nectar including that of pineland croton, Spanish needles and pineland acacia

METALMARKS

Little Metalmark Yellow thistle, short flowered composites

BRUSH FOOTED BUTTERFLIES

American Snout Hackberry, nectar from flowers including goldenrod and

asters

Gulf Fritillary Various passionflower vines, nectar from flowers including

Spanish needles, cordias and composites

Julia Various passionflower vines, nectar from flowers including lantana

and Spanish needles

Zebra Various passionflower vines, nectar and pollen from flowers including Spanish needles and lantana

Variegated Fritillary A variety of plants including passionflower, violets, purslane, stonecrop and moonseed, nectar from flowers of many

plants including common milkweed, dogbane, and tickseed sunflower Phaon Crescent Fogfruit, creeping Charlie and mat grass in the verbena

 ${\it family,}$ nectar from flowers of creeping Charlie and Spanish needles

Pearl Crescent Several species of aster, nectar from a great variety of

flowering plants including swamp milkweed, Spanish needles and asters

Cuban Crescent Shrimp plant and crimson dicliptera. nectar from flowers

mostly Spanish needles

Red Admiral Many plants of the nettle family, red admirals prefer sap flows

on trees, fermenting fruit and bird droppings

American Lady Plants in the sunflower family, nectar from flowers including aster, goldenrod and common milkweed

Painted Lady More than 100 host plants have been noted; favorites include thistle, mallow and various legumes, prefers nectar from composites 3-6 feet high, especially thistle; also aster and blazing star

Hackberry Emperor Various hackberries and sugarberry, sap, rotting fruit, dung and carrion

Tawny Emperor Various hackberries and sugarberry, sap, rotting fruit,

dung and carrion

White Peacock Smooth water-hyssop and creeping Charlie, Spanish needles

Viceroy Plants in the willow family, early in the season when few flowers

are available Viceroys feed on aphid honeydew, carrion, dung and decaying fungi. later generations feed more often at flowers including aster,

goldenrod and Spanish needles

Common Buckeye Plants from the snapdragon, verbern, plantain and acanthus families, nectar from flowers including aster and tickseed

sunflower

Mangrove Buckeye Black mangrove, flower nectar

Tropical Buckeye Stemodia, creeping charlie, ruella and porterweed,

flower nectar

Malachite **Green shrimp plant,** rotting fruit, bird droppings and nectar from

flowers

Florida Purplewing Crabwood, decaying fruit and nectar from cordia and

lantana

Dingy Purplewing Gumbo-limbo, rotting fruit, dung and sap; seldom flower

nectar

Florida Leafwing Pineland croton, rotting fruit and dung
Ruddy Daggerwing Short-leaf fig and strangler fig, nectars at
flowers of

giant milkweed

SATYRS

Carolina Satyr Several grasses including centipede and St. Augustine,

sap and rotting fruit

Georgia Satyr Sedges and grasses, rotting fruit

MILKWEED BUTTERFLIES

Monarch Milkweeds, nectar from all milkweed flowers as well as thistle

Queen Milkweeds, flower nectar

Soldier Milkweeds, nectar from flowers including milkweeds and Spanish

needles

SKIPPERS

Mangrove Skipper Red mangrove, nectar from flowers including mangrove,

Spanish needles, citrus and bougainvillea

Hammock Skipper
Zestos Skipper
Galactia, in the pea family, nectar from flowers including

Spanish needles, lantana and bougainvillea

Silver-spotted Skipper Woody legumes, the Silver-spotted Skipper almost

never visits yellow flowers but favors blue, red, purple and pink
Long-tailed Skipper Various legumes including various beans, hog
peanuts, beggar ticks, blue pea and wisteria, nectar from flowers
including bougainvillea, lantana and Spanish needles

Dorantes Longtail Various legumes including wild and cultivated beans and beggar ticks, nectar from flowers including Spanish

lantana and bougainvillea

Northern Cloudywing Various plants in the pea family including beggar

Juvenal's Duskywing Oaks, nectar from flowers including dandelion and

blueberry

Horace's Duskywing $\mbox{ Various oaks, nectar from flowers, up to 4.5 feet tall }$

including dogbane, goldenrod and peppermint

Florida Duskywing Locust-berry and Barbados cherry, nectar from flowers

of low plants and shrubs including Spanish needles, pineland croton and

lantana

Sleepy Duskywing Various oaks, nectar from heaths including wild azalea and

blueberry

Zarucco Duskywing Herbaceous legumes including black locust, hairy bush clover and Colorado River hemp, nectar from flowers including

Spanish needles

Tropical Checkered-Skipper Several plants in the mallow family including

broomweed, mallow, hollyhock and velvet-leaf, nectar from flowers
of

Sidas and Spanish needles

Hayhurst's Scallopwing Bloodleaf and occasionally chaff flowers,

nectar from flowers including marigold, knotweed, spearmint, cucumber

and clovers

Swarthy Skipper Bluestem grasses, nectar from low-growing flowers including selfheal, red clover and peppermint

Neamathla Skipper Bluestem grasses, flower nectar

Three-spotted Skipper Guinea grass, flower nectar

Euphala Skipper Various grasses including Johnson grass, Bermuda and

Sugarcane, nectar from flowers including alfalfa, croton, and creeping charlie

Southern Skipperling Bermuda grass, nectar from flowers such as sneezeweed

Least Skipper Various grasses including marsh millet and cultivated rice,

nectar from low growing flowering plants including wood sorrel, swamp

verbena, pickerelweed, Spanish needles lantata and white clover Fiery Skipper Various grasses including Bermuda, crabgrass and St. Augustine, nectar from flowers including sweet pepperbush, swamp milkweed, aster and thistle

Whirlabout Grasses including Bermuda and St. Augustine, nectar from Spanish needles and lantana

Sachem Grasses including Bermuda, crabgrass and St. Augustine, nectar

from many flowers including milkweeds, button bush and thistles Dotted Skipper Switchgrass, nectar from flower of prickly pear cactus,

alfalfa, and thistle

Tawny-edged Skipper Panic grasses, crabgrass and blue grass, nectar

from flowers including alfalfa, dogbane and thistle

Baracoa Skipper Grasses, flower nectar

Southern Broken-Dash Paspalum and St. Augustine grass, nectar from flowers including pickerelweed and sweet pepper bush

Dun Skipper Various sedges, nectar from white pink or purple flowers

Delaware Skipper Various grasses, nectar from pink and white flowers

including milkweeds, marsh fleabane, thistles and pickerelweed Arogos Skipper Big bluestem and other native grasses, nectar from flowers including ox-eye daisy, coreopsis and dogbane

Byssus Skipper Eastern gama grass, nectar from flowers including pickerelweed

Meske's Skipper Little blue stem and arrowfeather threeawn, nectar from blazing star, pickerelweed and others

Dusted Skipper Little bluestem and big bluestem, nectar from flowers

including wild strawberry, blackberry and wild hyacinth

Twin-spot Skipper Grasses, nectar from flowers including thistle Clouded Skipper Various grasses including St. Augustine and wooly beard grass, nectar from pink purple and white flowers including Spanish needles, buttonbush and lantana

Aaron's Skipper Possibly smooth cordgrass, nectar from flowers including

pickerelweed and marsh fleabane

Palatka Skipper Sawgrass, nectar from pickerelweed and other plants

Palmetto Skipper Saw palmetto, nectar from pickerelweed

Berry's Skipper **Sedges**, nectar from pickerelweed Dusky Roadside-Skipper **Grasses**, flower nectar

Ocola Skipper Rice, sugarcane and trompelilla, nectar from flowers including

lantana, Spanish needles, buttonbush and pickerelweed

Salt Marsh Skipper Seashore saltgrass, nectar from flowers including privet

marsh fleabane, thistle and verbena

Obscure Skipper Various grasses and sugarcane, nectar from rattlebox

Cofaqui Giant-Skipper Bear grass, Spanish bayonet and small yucca,

do not feed, but males sip moisture from mud

Yucca Giant-Skipper **Bear grass, Spanish bayonet and small yucca,**

do not feed, but males sip moisture from mud

Monk Skipper Various palms including saw palmetto, date and coconut,

nectar from hibiscus and other large flowers

Brazilian Skipper Cannas and alligator flag, nectar from large white and pale

yellow flowers
